Course description

This course investigates ancient cities from a comparative perspective. Using contemporary approaches to cities and the production of urban space, we will explore side-by-side cities of the ancient Near Eastern and Mediterranean world, with comparisons drawn as well from other regions such as Mesoamerica. We will investigate how cities were planned in the past and their monumental architecture shaped, with a special focus on Egyptian case studies such as the productive prehistoric site of Tell el-Dab^ca/Avaris.

Goals

The emergence of urbanism in the Old and New World is a phenomenon related to a multitude of innovations in architecture, technology, art and changes in social structure and directly connected to the rise of early states and complex societies. In this course we will discuss the role of cities in early state societies and define common principles of city life by comparing a wide geographic area from Egypt and the Near East to Greece, Italy as well as examples from Mesoamerica. We will reach an understanding of what cities represented in antiquity and contrast this with our own perspective on cities in the modern world. Following thematic sessions on aspects such as city planning, the social fabric of cities and cities and their hinterlands we will examine these aspects by looking at a specific case study from one region supplemented by readings contributing views from neighboring regions. This course will offer an archaeological perspective on urbanism in antiquity by also engaging with current theoretical debates and new perspectives on the emergence of cities in the Old and New World.

Readings and suggested textbook

The textbook is available at the bookstore and represents a recent general overview on urbanism in the Old and New World. While different chapters will be included in the readings students should consult this book as a general reading while attending the class. All other readings will be provided as PDF on the course website. If necessary the instructor will exchange readings ahead of time, but page numbers will not substantially increase.

Assignments

For each class students need to prepare the required readings in advance and be able to discuss them in class. The instructor will give a lecture in the first part of class to introduce the topic. For the second part of class, each student will be assigned to lead the discussion of one thematic session. Those assignments will be made in the first meeting according to personal interest and schedule. The student is expected to go through the required readings and get an overview on the respective topic. The discussion leader is expected to come prepared with a personal opinion and critical approach to the respective topic that he or she will be able to present at the beginning of the discussion and thus stimulate a lively debate.

A mid-term exam is scheduled for March 12th. The exam will consist of short answers and essay questions as well as the identification of specific sites or topographical features on maps.

Each student will be assigned a paper topic in the second part of the course. These research topics will be based on personal interest, themes explored during the first part of the course or specific issues and debates in the study of urbanism. Students are required to discuss the topic of their choice with the instructor in mid March and provide a bibliography on the respective topic a week before presentation. Presentations by each student will take place in the last two weeks of the semester and consist of an in-depth assessment of the respective topic using additional literature not provided in the class' bibliography. The presentations should be about 20 minutes long and will be followed by 5 minutes discussion. Discussion points and results need to be incorporated into the final paper. The final paper should have a length of 15 to 20 pages including bibliography.
