







COURSE DESCRIPTION, AIMS, AND OBJECTIVES

This course is the first semester of an intensive, yearlong introduction to the basic grammar of the Akkadian language, first attested over four thousand years ago in Mesopotamia, the core of which roughly corresponds to present-day Iraq. Also referred to by the names of its two main dialects, Babylonian and Assyrian, Akkadian is the earliest known member of the Semitic family of languages, which includes more familiar languages like Arabic and Hebrew. Akkadian was in use for over two and half millennia across a wide expanse of the Near East, from the Iran in the east, to Egypt in the west, as far as Turkey in the north, and south into the Arabian Peninsula. Throughout the semester students can expect:

- 1. To gain insights into the cultures of ancient Mesopotamia through an in-depth exploration of one of its principal languages.
- 2. To grapple with the intricacies of the cuneiform ("wedge-shaped") writing system from ancient Mesopotamia and master what scholars refer to as the Neo-Assyrian monumental script.
- 3. To master the fundamentals of the phonology, morphology, and grammar of Akkadian, with an emphasis on the classical dialect of the Old Babylonian period (i.e., the early 2nd millennium BCE).
- 4. To read Mesopotamian texts in the original script and language, including selections from the famous Laws of Hammurapi, as well as excerpts from myths, hymns, prayers, historical documents, letters, and other texts.


